Course description

This course will provide a high-level overview of general research methods that are common across many disciplines. Topics covered will range from formulating a research question to conducting specific analytical methodologies to writing/presenting results. Course enrollment restricted to graduate students enrolled in MTDA program.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Be aware of ethical challenges that may arise during the research process and understand how to resolve such challenges.
- Formulate a research question and conduct a literature review to understand the current knowledgebase.
- Understand quantitative approaches to research, including design, sampling, data collection, and analysis.
- Be able to summarize research results in writing and via visualizations, and then present results to an informed audience.
- Understand how to protect intellectual property.

How this course works

Mode of delivery: This course is 100% online. There is a required synchronous (real-time) session in Zoom approximately once per month on Wednesdays from 7:15-8:10p.m. The rest of your work is found in Carmen and can be completed around your own schedule during the week.

Pace of delivery: The course will use a mix of **synchronous** and **asynchronous** activities, organized into two-week modules.

Required **synchronous** activities will take place live over CarmenZoom during a subset of scheduled meeting times. These will typically occur every fourth week, as noted in the tentative schedule below and listed on the course website. Students are expected to attend and participate in these live, online class meetings.

Required **asynchronous** activities will be posted to the course Carmen site the Friday prior to the start of a new module. Deadlines will be explicitly noted on the Carmen website. These activities should typically be completed by the second Wednesday of the module (for activities needed for discussions either online or during synchronous sessions) or the Wednesday following the close of the module (for activities submitted for grading). Module activities may include:

- Reading assignments from the textbook
- Videos and similar short activities
- Quizzes that must be completed on Carmen and assess comprehension of reading and asynchronous video content
- Discussion posts
- Individual homework assignments
- Project-related activities

Students are encouraged to attend the instructor's weekly office hours via CarmenZoom as listed on the course Carmen site. These office hours will be conducted in a community format, where many students may join the videoconference at the same time. Students wishing to discuss a private matter should contact me to schedule a separate time to meet. Students are encouraged to participate on Carmen discussion boards.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a 1 credit-hour course. According to Ohio State bylaws on instruction (go.osu.edu/credithours), students should expect around 1 hour per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 2 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a C grade.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is a distance-education course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. The following is a summary of everyone's expected participation:

- Attending online, synchronous class meetings: USUALLY ONCE PER MONTH
 Students are expected to attend and participate in the online, synchronous Wedsday class meetings.
- Logging in: AT LEAST ONCE PER WEEK
 Be sure you are logging in to the course in Carmen each week, including weeks with
 holidays. You will need to log in to Carmen to complete quizzes, view video content and
 upload homework assignments. (During most weeks you will probably log in many
 times.) If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class,
 discuss it with me as soon as possible.
- Discussion forums: USUALLY ONCE PER WEEK
 As part of your participation, each week you can expect to post at least once as part of our substantive class discussion on the week's topics.
- Office hours: OPTIONAL OR FLEXIBLE
 Attending office hours and participating in discussion forums are encouraged, but optional. Individual office hour appointments outside of regularly scheduled times should be made at least 24 hours in advance whenever possible.

Descriptions of major course assignments

Homework will be assigned for each of the first 6 modules. Assignments will be posted to the course Carmen site on the Friday prior to the start of a module and are typically due on Wednesday of the week following the close of the module. Students should compile all homework solutions into a single .pdf file in accordance with specific homework instructions, and upload it to the course Carmen site. You are encouraged to work together on homework; however, each student must produce their own assignment to be handed in. Do not copy any part of another student's homework.

Quizzes will be administered weekly online, through Carmen. These short quizzes are meant to motivate you to complete the assigned activities and keep up with the asynchronous content. The quizzes are open book / open notes but should be completed without any external help or communication. Quizzes may be attempted twice, where the highest score is recorded.

Participation will be assessed via student participation on course discussion boards, where students will be expected to post their own work and comment on their peers' work.

One comprehensive **project** will be due during exam week, as noted in the course schedule. Students will submit a final summary report and 5-minute video overview in the style of a "speed session" conference presentation. Interim project-related activities will be incorporated into homework assignments throughout the course.

Late assignments

Generally, late homework assignments are not accepted. Please plan your time so that you can complete assignments far enough in advance to avoid any last-minute problems uploading your completed work. If exceptional circumstances (sudden onset of illness, unexpected family situations, etc.) arise, contact the instructor to discuss the possibility of an extension.

 writing a research paper, you should remember to write using good grammar, spelling,
 and punctuation. A more conversational tone is fine for non-academic topics.
- Tone and civility: Let's maintain a supportive learning community where everyone feels safe and where people can disagree amicably. Remember that sarcasm doesn't always come across online. I will provide specific guidance for discussions on controversial or personal topics.
- **Citing your sources**: When we have academic discussions, please cite your sources to back up what you say. For the textbook or other course materials, list at least the title and page numbers. For online sources, include a link.
- **Backing up your work**: Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
- Synchronous sessions: During our Zoom sessions I ask you to use your real name and a
 clear photo of your face in your Carmen profile. During our full-group lecture time, you
 may turn your camera off if you choose. When in breakout rooms or other small-group
 discussions, having cameras and mics on as often as possible will help you get the most
 out of activities. You are always welcome to use the free, Ohio State-themed virtual
 backgrounds (go.osu.edu/zoom-backgrounds). Remember that Zoom and the Zoom chat
 are our classroom space where respectful interactions are expected.]
